# First steps



### 1. Practical Informations

- ✓ Please use our <u>website</u> to access resources. All relevant links are gathered:
  - ➤ <u>Electronic resources</u> (press, on line journals, dictionnaries and encyclopaedias, databases...)
  - > Catalogue to localise printed items (books, periodicals, thesis...) and some ebooks
  - > One Search direct access to on line academic articles and e-book



- ✓ When off-campus you have to ID after choosing a resource: use your Sciences Po email or Google Apps ID (fisrtname.name and personal password).
- ✓ Any question ?: use <u>Ask a librarian</u> from any page of our website. Different services are proposed to you:



- > the **chat** for a quick question;
- > or the **email us** service to submit a question, comment, or suggestion
- ✓ Don't forget our <u>Book a librarian</u> service for an individual research workshop on your own subjects when preparing a paper.
- ✓ Our <u>Guides thématiques</u> gather information, tools and tips selected by our librarians in your field (political science, law, economics, history...). You can contact the resource librarians as well!

## 2. A starter: encyclopaedias and general tools

- EncyclopaediaBritannica : expert articles enhanced by other media, timelines, atlas and a comparing country tool...
- Oxford Reference : reference ebooks and bilingual dictionary french/english, english/french
- > Oxford Reference Online : ressources and reference ebooks

## 3. To read press or to find a press article

- ✓ Use specilized providers searching by key words, date or language.
  - ➤ <u>Europresse</u>: French press database including Le Monde. 8 simultaneous connexions only, so please don't forget to click on "déconnexion" when you've finished.
  - Factiva : More than 35.000 sources from all over the world in 26 languages : newspapers, magazines, news agency dispatches, market information and firms details.

## 4. To find an academic online article

- ✓ Use One Search if you know the article's title.
- ✓ Use Online journals if you only know the journal title.



Exemple: you're looking for an article published in 1979 in *International affairs* 

- 1. Get to Online journals page
- 2. Enter the title in the search field (make sure you have selected "Title begins with" or "Title contains all words")
- 3. Select relevant access according to the year you look for (differents providers depending of holding years)

4. Select one of them

## 5. Translating and defining

- ➤ Grand Robert : the reference dictionary for French language
- > Oxford Language Dictionary : bilingual dictionary English / French


## 6. Find resources by discipline

✓ Use subject related databases

Exemple: need international relations resources

- 1. Get to Electronic ressources page
- 2. Select "International Relations" in the Subjects list

### 7. Free resources

Our electronic resources website proposes also free quality resources, like the folloing ones:

- Sciences Po <u>Cartothèque</u> : free access database of maps and graphics of contemporary world space. It is proposed by the Sciences Po Atelier de cartographie
- ➤ Khartis : This tool was developed by the Sciences Po Atelier de cartographie, enabling you to easily create your own maps from several basemaps available with different geographical divisions.
- ➤ <u>LegiFrance</u>: official portal offering public access to the legislation and case law of France. Contains English translations of French codes currently in force
- ➤ <u>Eur-Lex</u>: provides free access to European Union law and other documents considered to be public. The website is available in 23 official languages of the European Union. The contents of the site amount to some 2 815 000 documents with texts dating back to 1951



Please find below other free resources:

➤ Internet Archive → 8 million books, 2.5 million audio recordings and 1 million free images, including more than 500 unique documents from Sciences Po's library digitized and searchable.
