## Foreign Security Policies and Internal Security

### Objectives of the International Seminar

The 2015 joint seminar between King's College London (KCL) and Sciences Po-CERI expands and builds upon previous joint CERI-KCL seminars, such as the 2012 workshop on prevention at CERI, the 2013 colloquium on The European Union and the BRICS at KCL with the participation of PUC Rio, and the 2014 doctoral seminar on *The Making of Foreign and Defence Policy: Actors and Processes*. The two-day 2015 joint research seminar aims to investigate and compare European policy-making processes in four key and interrelated policy areas (or sectors): foreign policy; defence policy; internal security; and intelligence. In particular, it seeks (a) to scrutinize and compare the role of the state and societal actors involved in the decision-making processes of each sector; (b) to analyse the influence of third countries and international organisations in the making of these policies: USA, Russia, NATO, UN Security Council; (c) to investigate the interactions among the actors and processes across the four policy areas; (d) to assess the degree of inter-sectoral complementarity or conflict between the various dimensions of foreign and security policy making. By bringing together scholars and Ph.D. students from Sciences Po-CERI and KCL, the seminar also seeks to deepen the cooperation between Sciences Po and KCL by strengthening the institutional ties and research partnership between these two leading institutions in the field of foreign and security policy.

### Format

The two-day seminar is structured in four panels, each covering one of the aforementioned policy areas. At the end of each day, a one-hour roundtable discussion will allow to bring to light the convergences/divergences among the key actors and processes among the four policy areas.
