 - Pressure on social security systems


The role of ICT – a General Purpose Technology

- Optimism about ICT revolution in 1990s
 - Death of distance / the world is flat (Cairncross / Friedman)
 - Prospects of end of cities, rapid convergence and end of business cylce
- Developments since then
 - Deepest recession since 1930s
 - Revival of cities
 - Widening regional disparities

Recession in Europe

- Huge variation in Europe
 - Between countries and also within countries
 - But also in terms of output and unemployment
- Caused by
 - Different insititional settings
 - Different degrees of integration in the world economy
 - Different sectoral specialization patterns

Figure 12. Sensitivity of the business cycle of regions





Figure 14. Sectoral composition and change in regional GDP (2009, in %)



Impressive policy challenges ahead

- Smart growth
- Sustainable growth
- Inclusive growth
- Against the background of equity-efficiency trade-offs requiring need for integrated approach and the notion that one size fits all policies will not work

Fundamental trade-offs


- Growth inequality
 - Kuznets curve
 - Role of physical and human capital in the growth process
- Growth sustainability
 - Green Kuznets curve
 - Porter hypothesis
- Specialization diversity
 - Agglomeration literature

Facing the trade-offs


 World with winners and losers (regions or people)




- Moving towards frontier
- Moving the frontier out
- Optimal position conditional on preferences




Trade-offs in outcomes



Resulting in structural differences




Caused by institutional differences

Role for regional policies...

- Basic idea: supporting 'investments' can enhance growth and speed up convergence
 - neoclassical growth theories
 - endogenous growth theories
 - new economic geography

... but with pletohora of problems

- Crowding out
- Spill-overs to other regions
- Financed projects need not be growth enhancing
- Misallocation of scarce resources due to co-financing
- Effectiveness conditional on good institutional quality

Need for good evaluation tools

- Three methodologies to evaluate effectiveness
 - macroeconomic I/O models (used by 'the commission')
 - case studies
 - econometric approaches (ex-post evaluation)
- Still 'dominance' of ex ante evaluations
- But increasingly more recognition of need for ex post
 - collection and disclosure of data
 - policy as part of a continuous learning process

Some evidence of past policies

- Evidence from meta-analysis
 - Statistical survey of existing literature ('Analysis of analyses')
- Huge variety of results
 - According to regions and periods considered, empirical approach, etc.
- Although jury is still out, evidence is at best highly mixed
 - Need for more primary research, need for good data

Challenges ahead – I

- Recognition of location and time specificities
- Focus on continuous learning (during and ex-post)
- Collection of information on policies and effects
- Multiple goals require multiple instruments

Challenges ahead – II

- Deepening of Europe
 - political union euro crisis but also importance of scale
 - recognition of cultural diversity
 - requiring specialization
 - addressing equity efficiency trade-off at European level
 - acknowledge subsidiarity principles
