Opening Speech: Élisabeth Moreno is the Minister for Gender Equality, Diversity and Equal Opportunities reporting to the Prime Minister. With a Master's degree in Business Law from the Paris-Est Créteil University Ms. Moreno rounded off her education and professional training at the National School of Magistrates to qualify as judge at the Tribunal de Commerce. On 6 July 2020, she was appointed by the President of the Republic, Emmanuel Macron, as minister for Gender Equality, Diversity and Equal Opportunities, reporting to the Prime Minister.

Keynote Panelist: Former Minister of Foreign Affairs of Spain, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ms. González has a degree in Law University of Navarra, and postgraduate in European Law, University of Carlos III. Ms. González started her career in the private sector advising companies on trade, competition and state-aid matters. She was European Commission Spokeswoman for Trade and for eight years Chief of Staff of World Trade Organization.

Keynote Panelist: Ms. Mogherini is the Rector of the College of Europe since September 2020. Ms. Mogherini co-chairs the United Nations High Level Panel on Internal Displacement since January 2020. Previously Ms. Mogherini has served as the High Representative of the European Union for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy and Vice-President of the European Commission, from 2014 to 2019. Prior to joining the EU, Ms. Mogherini was Italian Minister for Foreign Affairs.



Mark Maloney

Chair: Mark Maloney is the Acting Dean and Executive Director of the Paris School of International Affairs (PSIA) at Sciences Po. He joined PSIA in Autumn 2017 from the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE), where Mr. Maloney spent nearly 15 years, initially as Head of Student Administration (2003-08) and subsequently as Head of Academic Partnerships (2008-17) and Director of LSE Careers (2016-17).

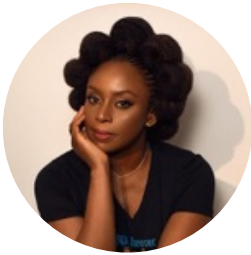
Keynote Speaker: Dr Soumya Swaminathan was appointed WHO's first Chief Scientist in March 2019. Dr. Swaminathan is a globally recognized researcher on tuberculosis and HIV, Dr. Swaminathan was Secretary to the Government of India for Health Research and Director General of the Indian Council of Medical Research from 2015 to 2017. From 2009 to 2011, Dr. Swaminathan also served as Coordinator of the UNICEF/UNDP/World Bank/WHO Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases in Geneva.



Louis Pizarro

Chair: Louis Pizarro is the CEO of Solthis, an NGO working on health system strengthening in Africa. Mr. Pizarro previously worked as a clinical physician before joining Solthis in 2004, first as Head of Mission in Niger - where Mr. Pizarro supported the Nigerian government in the establishment of the National Program for Access to HIV/AIDS Treatment, then as CEO since 2006.

Keynote Speaker: Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie has a Master's Degree in African Studies from Yale University, and in Creative Writing from Johns Hopkins University. Ms. Ngozi Adichie first novel, *Purple Hibiscus*, won the Commonwealth Writers' Prize, and her second novel, *Half of a Yellow Sun*, won the Orange Prize. Her 2013 novel *Americanah* won the US National Book Critics Circle Award, and was named one of *The New York Times* Top Ten Best Books of 2013.

Ms. Ibrahim was appointed as a United Nations Sustainable Development Goals Advocate.
