Objective of the Course

The course serves as an introduction to the field of study on the European Union's (EU) foreign policy. Students will acquire fundamental knowledge including the EU's "actorness" in the international system, the institutional design of the EU's foreign policy, and concrete examples of the EU's engagement in global affairs.

Session 1: The EU as an International Actor

The session will introduce the broad aspects which EU foreign policy incorporates and the concept of the EU's actorness studied in academic literature.
